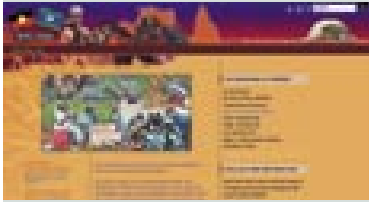

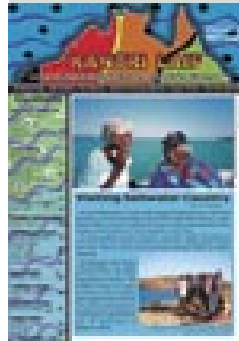


The North Australian Indigenous Land and Sea Management Alliance (NAILSMA) was developed between 2002 and 2004.

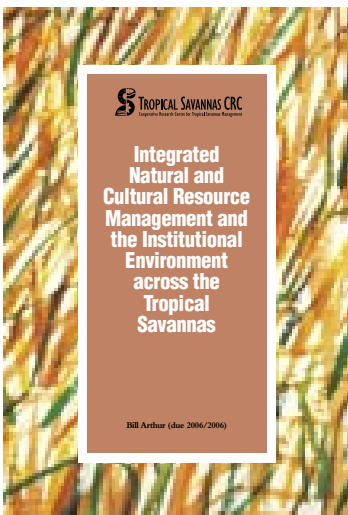
Kantri Laif Newsletter

Integrated Natural and Cultural Resource Management and the Institutional Environment

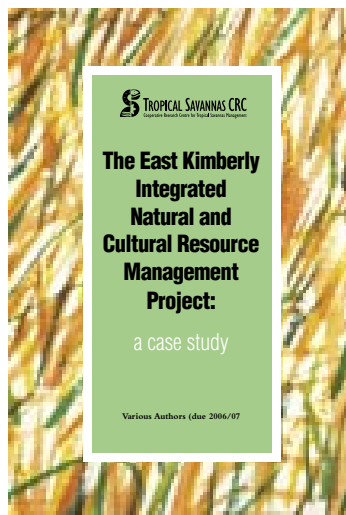


Bill Arthur (due 2007)

It considers the current role various government, private and community-based institutions play in pastoralism and multiple land use that involves indigenous communities and examines the need for new institutional arrangements.

Towards more strategic management of weeds on Top End Aboriginal Lands

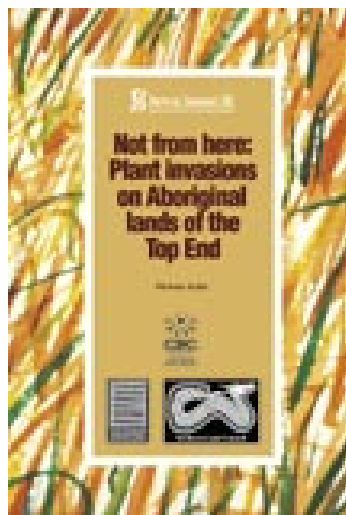


Mark Gardener (2005)
